

Footpath on The Street

Walking along the eastern side of **The Street** recently you will have noticed that for much of its length the pavement is in a pretty poor condition, so it is good to hear that Norfolk Highways are planning to rectify this. Starting this autumn contractors will lift and replace the kerbstones and resurface the footpath from the entrance to Squirrels Drift as far as the newly built house which replaces The Homestead, the last house on the left on the way to Rockland. This is really good news as there are a number of places where the footpath is badly damaged making it difficult for pedestrians to negotiate.

The footpath beyond the entrance to The Homestead is in a particularly poor state with hazardous tree roots. As there is no easy way to avoid these roots the footpath south of the entrance to The Homestead will be removed (shown here in green) and a new footpath (shown in grey) will provide safe pedestrian access to and from Framingham Lane on the opposite side of The Street.

Work on the footpath is scheduled to start in September and will last several weeks. Unfortunately there will be disruption and lengthy road closures, but access will be maintained for those living along The Street. Bus services will also be disrupted.


This project is entirely funded by Norfolk County Council so there will be no cost to the Parish Council.

What to do in Bramerton in the coming months?

Why not go apple picking! If you have never been to the village community orchard on Mill Hill now is a good time to visit. All the young trees are heritage varieties, each clearly labelled. There are apples to suit all tastes - just help yourself.

To the north of the younger trees is a dense copse with a number of well established fruit trees. Of particular note is the *Ellison's Orange*, one of the trees nearest Hill House Road. At the beginning of August this was absolutely laden with apples, noted for their distinctive aniseed flavour.



At the village hall there's Pimms and cream tea on September 14 and a Chilli quiz night on October 17. In addition, on the last Friday of every month there's a regular Social club evening. Sudden limb fall
